**The RHS Banksian Medal will be awarded to the entrant with the highest number of place points in the whole of the horticultural classes at the show. (This medal cannot be awarded to the same person for two years running.)**

## Rules and how to enter

### All entries

Residents of the parishes of Binfield Heath, Eye & Dunsden, Harpsden and Shiplake are eligible to enter all classes. Everyone else may enter Open classes only. Entries, on the form provided, should be delivered to Binfield Heath Village Stores or the Corner Shop, Lower Shiplake. Entry forms must be in by 8.00pm on the Wednesday before the show. Late forms are not accepted.

**All entries are free of charge.**

Only one entry per exhibitor is allowed in each class. Each exhibit must be the work of the exhibitor. Each exhibitor will be allotted a number which will be placed on a card with his or her exhibits. Exhibits must be in position in the show tent by 10.30am on Show Day.

Only judges and committee members may enter the tent during judging.

Prizes unless otherwise stated will be: 1st prize £2; 2nd prize £1; 3rd prize 40p. 'Highly Commended' and 'Commended' may also be awarded. Points in classes 1 and 174 will be 15-10-5. If there are fewer than three entries in a section 1st prize will not necessarily be awarded.

Cups are awarded on a points system: 1st prize, 10 points; 2nd prize, 5 points, 3rd prize, 2 points. In the event of a tie, judges will look for exhibitors with the most 1st, 2nd or 3rd prizes to award the cup.

The Silver Jubilee Award is awarded to the family group winning the highest aggregate points in all sections. Five extra points are awarded for a three-generation entry. To calculate the winner, the total number of points won by each group will be divided by the number of people entering.

Prize money not collected by 4.30pm on Show Day will be taken as a donation to Show funds.

Judges may withhold prizes if they consider the exhibits not worthy of winning or there are insufficient entries in a class.

Exhibits must be left in position until 4.30pm and should be removed before 5pm or they may be included in the auction of produce for show funds.

Objections should be in writing, signed by the objector and handed to the Show Secretary before 3.00pm.

**Children's entries** children must state on their

entry forms the age they will be on show day.

## Horticultural entries

Cut flowers must be presented in the standard vases which are supplied by the Committee.

Produce must have been in the possession of the exhibitor for at least two months before the Show.

Exhibitors' gardens and allotments must be open for inspection by members of the Committee after entries have been received.

## Flower Show Top Tray Class

1st prize £10.00, 2nd prize £7.00, 3rd prize £3.00

The Flower Show Top Tray class is for a display of three types of vegetables from the following list of eight. The quantity of each required for the collection is given in brackets.

Carrots (3), cauliflowers (2), onions (3), parsnips (3), peas (6 pods), potatoes (3), runner beans (6 pods), tomatoes (6).

Each type of vegetable will be judged out of a total of 20 points. This is split into three sections: 7 points for size, shape and colour; 7 points for condition; 6 points for uniformity. The total marks will therefore be 60.

All vegetables are to be displayed for effect, within an area of 18" x 24" (45cm x 60cm). This can be a tray (measured area within lip) or a board or the area can simply be marked on the staging.

No part of any vegetable may be bent and no part of any exhibit may exceed the size of the display area.

A black cloth is allowed or the tray may be painted. Parsley is allowed for garnishing but no other foliage or accessories (eg plates, sand, rings). Onion tops may be tied or whipped using raffia.

## Notes for judges and exhibitors

Carrots and parsnips must have foliage trimmed back to 3". Peas and beans must be displayed with some stalk attached. Tomatoes must be displayed with calyces (the green flower bud case).

Judges may handle exhibits and open pods to check quality. Any queries that may arise, concerning anything other than the rules above, should be referred to and decided by show officials. Failure to abide by any of these rules will lead to disqualification.

## Jam/Preserves Entries

All jams/preserves should be shown in plain jars, labelled with date and contents, sealed with wax discs and the jam jars should be filled to the brim. Twist top jars/lids are acceptable but must not show any brand name

## Make a Scarecrow competition

Your scarecrow must be made from scratch.

You are encouraged to use recycled materials.

Your scarecrow should be a maximum height of 6 feet.

We will provide a stake on the show ground to support your scarecrow.
